

HIGHLIGHTS



30 MILLION TONNES OF GOODS SHIPPED

The Port of Sept-Îles is proud to announce that in early December 2020, well before year end, it had shipped 30 million tonnes of goods. The symbolic 30 millionth tonne shipped out from the Port on its way to China aboard the C. VISION from Quebec Iron Ore.



RECORD SHIPPING VOLUME

Maritime shipments in the first quarter of 2020 set new records for the Port of Sept-Îles. We started the new year with a record shipping volume. The Port experienced major growth through January, February, and March, handling 7.9 million tonnes transported by 112 vessels. This growth was partly due to a new player, Tacora, which accounted for 600,000 tonnes. In comparison, by the end of the first quarter of 2019, the Port saw 5.3 million tonnes shipped on 75 vessels.



MODERNIZING THE POINTE-AUX-BASQUES TERMINAL

The work mainly consists of installing a new facade made up of piles and sheet piles in front of the existing wharf, replacing the upper tie-rods, improving the defense and mooring system, extending the facade to the existing jetty and redoing the terminal's surface.

MESSAGE FROM MANAGEMENT



Well before the end of the year, the Port of Sept-Îles proudly announced it had surpassed the 30-million-tonne mark for goods shipped in early December. This level of activity has not been seen since the iron industry's late-1970s boom, when the Port ranked second in Canada. Reaching this major milestone was one of the year's main highlights. It cements the Port's position as a leader among top-tier cargo ports in North America.

Behind every tonne handled throughout the year stands a multitude of men and women working in various logistics chains to serve the port. Together they account for more than 4,000 direct and indirect jobs in and around the port of Sept-Îles. They all deserve recognition.

This is even more remarkable given the COVID-19 pandemic that disrupted our lives and work. We hold in high regard and sincerely thank all healthcare and other service workers who stood strong on the front lines to manage this unprecedented crisis.

STRONG RESULTS, SUSTAINABLE ACTIONS

It was with determination in the face of pandemic-fueled adversity that we handled 33.1 million tonnes, making 2020 the best year for the Port since the Port Authority was created in 1999. By handling this much cargo, the Port rose to third among Canadian ports, behind only Vancouver and Montreal. A 13% year-over-year increase in shipping volumes was primarily due to growth in iron ore shipments from Rio Tinto IOC and Tacora.

Unfortunately, the cruise industry suffered a severe downturn due to COVID-19 as cruise activity was cancelled for all destinations across the country, a once-unthinkable scenario.

The Port also recorded great achievements throughout 2020 as it continued its environmental leadership on the St. Lawrence: - \$500,000 in funding towards the creation of a research chair at the start of the year with Université Laval and INREST to study coastal

ecosystems and port activity - \$250,000 in funding towards the launch of the Centre for Industrial Port Expertise (CEIP) in July - Arrival of two scientific research missions in the Bay of Sept-Îles on board the Amundsen and Corialis II research vessels.

This track record proves the Port's unshakable commitment to protecting the invaluable bay ecosystem in Sept-Îles, as well as a firm desire to ensure sustainable management of port operations by improving scientific knowledge via research activities. We proudly recall the remarks of Chantal Rouleau, Minister for Transport and Minister Responsible for the Metropolis and the Montréal Region, at the announcement of the research chair on coastal ecosystems and port activity at Université Laval :

"The creation of this research chair aligns perfectly with initiatives our government wants to see develop as a result of Quebec's new maritime vision for 2035. This maritime vision, which is currently being developed, will help guide the government as it reconciles economic, social, and environmental progress in Quebec."

NEW PORT FACILITIES

Work on the \$20 million Pointe-aux-Basques terminal upgrade project has proceeded smoothly and remained on time and on budget despite the brief pandemic-related work stoppage. Thanks to about 150 workers on site, about 90% of the work was completed by the end of the year. The new terminal, which is expected to be completed at the start of summer 2021, will enable the ship Bella Desgagnés to return to the terminal and provide service to the lower North Shore. Completion of the innovative \$3 million modular service building at the multi-user dock will bring in the facilities needed to ensure effective and reliable ship loading operations.

TOGETHER!

2020 challenged us to find new ways of working and living, both professionally and in our personal lives. It showed our ability to innovate, adapt, and stay resilient in a situation that has lasted longer than anyone ever imagined. Despite all this, we managed to scale new heights together! We would like to sincerely thank all the Port's board members and the entire team for their remarkable dedication throughout this exceptional year, which made our outstanding results possible. Finally, we're pleased and proud to see how the actions we took to support families and other clients of many local organizations made a real difference. Our actions showed our commitment to our community and proved, now more than ever, that we are "Together, with you!"

COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

When the pandemic and lockdown started, the Port sought to do things differently, reaching out to various community and family organizations to help them in a variety of ways. Each ad ran for four weeks, giving these organizations regional exposure they would not otherwise have been able to afford.

We're particularly proud of our partnership with Marée motrice and the Patinoire du gardien skating rink at Vieux Poste. This tireless and committed group of volunteers created a magical Christmas experience at Vieux-Poste. The Port was more than happy to pitch in for upgrades to the skating oval and its enchanting site, which has become a gathering place for the Uashat mak Mani-utenam and Sept-Îles communities. Skaters and spectators of all ages came together to savour a moment of pure skating pleasure or a sip of hot chocolate in front of a fire as retro music echoed through the trees.

PORT ACTIVITIES



Despite the pandemic's worldwide disruption of economic activity, the Port of Sept-Îles continued to grow, with a 13% increase in volume handled or 33,076,357 tonnes in 2020 versus 29,324,703 tonnes for the previous year. It was the second-best year since the record-setting 34,948,000 tonnes handled in 1979, and the best year since the Sept-Îles Port Authority was created in 1999.

This volume of cargo also lifted the Port to third among Canadian ports, chiefly due to a 14% year-over-year increase in iron ore shipments.

In 2020, 508 ships anchored in the Bay of Sept-Îles–26 more than in 2019. The cruise industry suffered in 2020 due to a country-wide ban on cruise ship traffic during the pandemic. This is a major change from 2019, which was a record year with eight stopovers and 18,655 passengers and crew.

FINANCIAL

The \$24.6 million growth in revenues (+18%) stems mainly from increased activities at the multi-user dock. Operating expenses fell 9% to \$14.1 million due to lower administrative expenses for the year.

Higher revenues and lower operating expenses resulted in a healthy year-end operating income of \$10.5 million, up \$5.3 million from the previous year.

Other items were exceptionally impacted by amounts related to the settlement of the \$5.5 million multi-user dock construction dispute, as well as by changes in the fair market value of interest-rate swaps.

The overall result is a positive balance of \$12.8 million, down from \$14.7 million the previous year.

Key investments made by the Port during the year were allocated to the Pointe-aux-Basques terminal rehabilitation project (\$17.7 million), the new multi-user dock service building (\$3.2 million), and the \$13.3 million in compensation the Superior Court of Quebec awarded in April 2020 to Pomerleau Inc., which had filed a motion for over \$59 million in 2014.

The Port of Sept-Îles and INREST (Northern Institute for Research in Environment and Occupational Health and Safety) were proud to welcome the Canadian Coast Guard's research icebreaker Amundsen. The Amundsen carried the Odyssée Saint-Laurent research program's third winter oceanography mission to collect advanced data on the St. Lawrence Estuary ecosystem in winter. The research included taking samples at locations within the waters of the Port of Sept-Îles. Those samples will yield strategic winter results to complement the data already collected by the Bay of Sept-Îles Environmental Observatory.

It was a tremendous opportunity for the Port and the Observatory to welcome the Odyssée Saint-Laurent research program and be part of its research loop. INREST (Northern Institute for Research in Environment and Occupational Health and Safety) and the Port of Sept-Îles were thrilled to announce the inauguration of the first research centre on industrial port ecosystems, the Centre for Industrial Port Expertise (CEIP), a division of INREST. CEIP's mission is to offer services and scientific expertise on the environment and occupational health. Experts and researchers from various sectors provide managers in the region and in other maritime regions of Quebec, Canada, and abroad with centralized R&D services and technical support adapted to the specific environmental, management, and operational challenges of industrial port areas.

This innovative initiative, which will support research by the Bay of Sept-Îles Environmental Observatory, was made possible thanks to a major grant (\$351,000) under the Quebec government's Blue Fund program set up to support initiatives in line with the objectives of the Quebec Maritime Strategy. The project also secured long-term funding from big industry, the City and the Port of Sept-Îles, and regional leaders and collaborators in support of CEIP. We would especially like to thank CEIP members on the North Shore: IOC/Rio Tinto, Aluminerie Alouette, Quebec Iron Ore, the City of Sept-Îles, and Développement économique Sept-Îles.

Our industrial port community's commitment to the only environmental monitoring observatory on the St. Lawrence sets us apart on the national scene. This unique initiative has many other benefits, including the creation of local scientific expertise that will help the region attract and retain talent as well as the broad-ranging impacts of the research projects and numerous future partnerships. **President & CEO, Port of Sept-fles**

PORT OF SEPT-ÎLES CONTRIBUTION \$250,000 / 5 YEARS

SEPTEMBER

The Centre for Industrial Port Expertise (CEIP), a division of INREST (Northern Institute for Research in Environment and Occupational Health and Safety) and the Port of Sept-Îles proudly welcomed the Coriolis II, a floating lab with space dedicated solely to research. The ship carried a summer oceanography mission to collect advanced data on the St. Lawrence River ecosystem as part of the Odyssée Saint-Laurent research program. INREST and its CEIP division were pleased to partner with the Quebec Maritime Network (RQM) on another Odyssée Saint-Laurent mission. The data acquired by CEIP through its partnership with RQM will be used for environmental monitoring and to implement the Enviro-Actions management model in the Sept-Îles port zone. The CEIP team will also share the knowledge it acquires with other port zones.

CEIP was just launched in July and already it's joining RQM's Odyssey mission and contributing to the environmental monitoring being done for our invaluable bay ecosystem in Sept-Îles. We're pleased and proud that this leadership will also benefit our neighbouring port zones and we wish all the research teams on board the Coriolis II a highly productive mission. **Pierre D. 
HIGHLIGHTS



Quebec Iron Ore, in partnership with Investissement Quebec and the Société du Plan Nord, announced investments totaling \$135 million to increase transshipment capacity at SFP Pointe-Noire and support its plans to double production through the Bloom Lake Phase II mine expansion.



The Pacific South set sail with 80,000 tonnes of Tacora Resources iron ore and 78,500 tonnes of Tata Steel iron ore, 40,000 tonnes of which were loaded at the multi-user dock and 38,500 tonnes at the IOC dock. It's extremely rare to carry cargo from different companies on the same ship. This is only the second time since the multi-user dock came into service, showcasing the level of flexibility the SFP Pointe-Noire and multi-user port facilities can offer to the iron industry.



The Port of Sept-Îles is an essential service during the COVID-19 pandemic. The Port's priority is to safeguard the health and well-being of its employees, maritime and port personnel, and the Sept-Îles community. In these challenging times, the Port of Sept-Îles has been able to safely ensure continuity in the merchandise transportation logistics chain, working with shippers, ship crews, dock workers, and all supply chain stakeholders to keep goods moving and preserve the important spinoff effects of uninterrupted shipping operations.
